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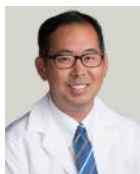

SESSION DETAILS

Session 1: will set the stage for the entire workshop focused on inter-professional, multidisciplinary, and inter-religious (in as far as some Christian and Muslim perspectives are highlighted) dialogue on the religious and spiritual dimensions of health and healing. It will bring together a theologian, a religious bioethicist, and social scientist to discuss the dimensionality and aspects of health.

Session 2: will build upon the definitions of health and healing that will be addressed in session 1 and will further explore the practical realities of providing healthcare that is both accommodating and embracing of religion and spirituality.

Session 3: will explore the concept of pain and suffering and how it is understood by different religious traditions.—Is there a redemptive dimension to pain and suffering; how about a dimension of God-closeness?

Session 4: will explore the nuanced concept of human vulnerability, as a lens for understanding how persons experience illness and what it means to be a “patient,” as well as for examining how clinical staff experience the work of offering care.
