Four General Stages of Our Souls

1

Life of Souls

We were souls without bodies

Revelatory Evidence:

“Remember when your Lord took out from the loins of the children of Adam their offspring and said, “Am I not your Lord?” and they said, “Yes indeed, we testify.” ‘Now you have no right to say on Judgment Day, ‘We were not aware of this.’”
(Sūrah al-Aʿrāf, 7:172)

2

This Life

Our souls were breathed into our bodies

Revelatory Evidence:

“... then an angel is sent to it and it breathes the soul into it and it is commanded to write down four things ...”
(Ṣaḥīḥ al-Bukhārī-Hadith No. 3208)

3

In the Grave

Our souls will separate from our bodies and our bodies will decay

Revelatory Evidence:

“Every soul shall experience death.” (Sūrah al-ʿImrān, 3:185), here it says that every soul shall “experience” death, and in many other translations, it says shall “taste” death, so this shows that death is not the end, but a step in a continued process.

The Afterlife

Our souls will be reunited with our resurrected bodies

Revelatory Evidence:

“... then it will be blown in again and we will suddenly stand up, looking.”
(Sūrah al-Zumar, 39:68)



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Rational Evidence for the Existence of the Soul

We know we have a soul through *introspection*.

That means that we can look inside ourselves and see that the thing that experiences cognition, pain, pleasure, happiness, sadness, humility, arrogance, gratitude, ingratitude, is something other than our bodies.

We're not exactly sure what the soul is, but we know that it's there.

Neuroscientific Reductionism

World consists of **only** Physical objects
AND they only have measurable properties
The only things that exists can be measured:
Mass, Volume, Length, Shape, Velocity, etc.
Everything else ***does not exist.***

We are made of **physical substances** with
physical properties which can be measured and
studied with scientific methods.

Incomplete view of the world:

Does not explain:

1. Experiences, Intentionality and Human Nature
2. Removes Meaning/Purpose from World

Holistic Worldview

World consists of Physical **and** Metaphysical things

Physical objects have metaphysical properties:

Qualia

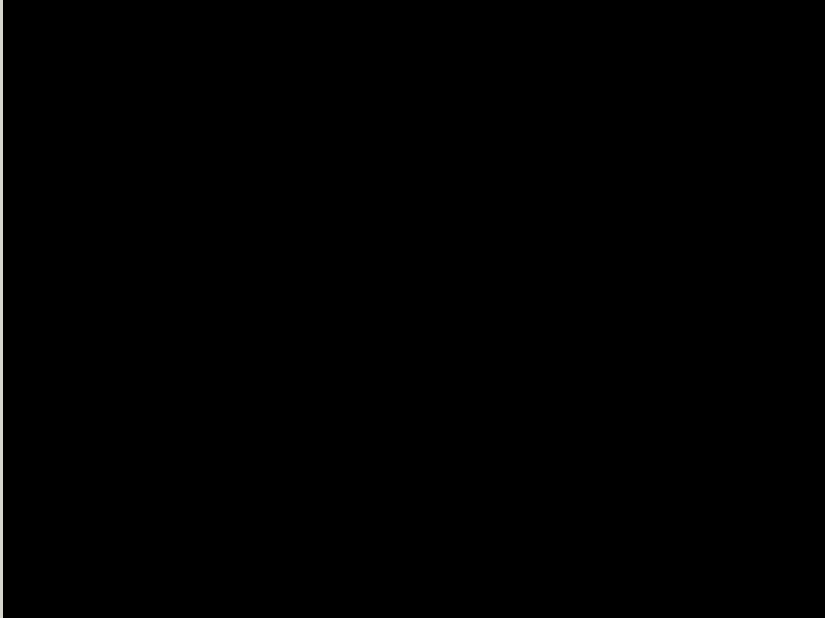

Neuroscientific Reductionism:

I am just my brain

Consciousness can be reduced to a brain state.

Nietzsche's philosophical masterpiece *Thus Spoke Zarathustra*, states: "The awakened and knowing say: body am I entirely, and nothing more; and soul is only the name for something about the body."

Francis Crick writes in his *The Astonishing Hypothesis: The Scientific Search for the Soul*: "You, your joys and your sorrows, your memories and your ambitions, your sense of personal identity and free will, are in fact no more than the behavior of a vast assembly of nerve cells and their associated molecules."

This "neurocentric" view has been widely accepted. **"The idea that we are our brains is now firmly established"**

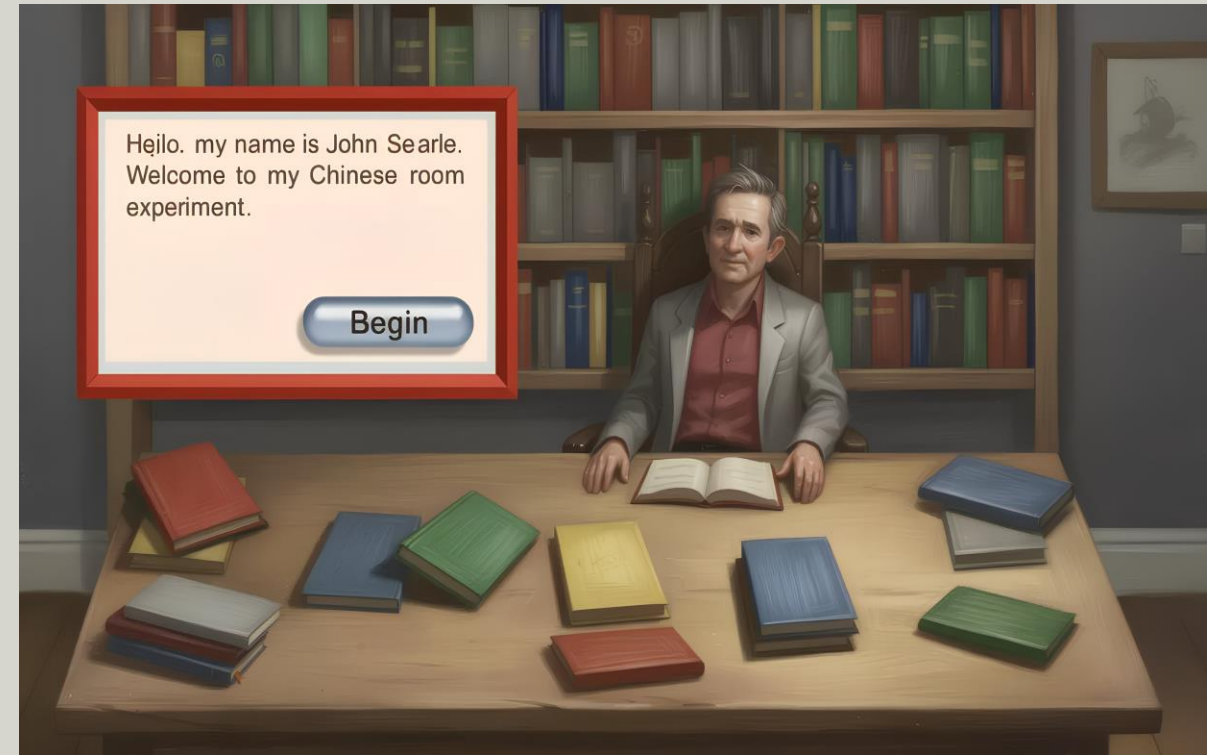
Is Artificial Intelligence Really Human-Like?

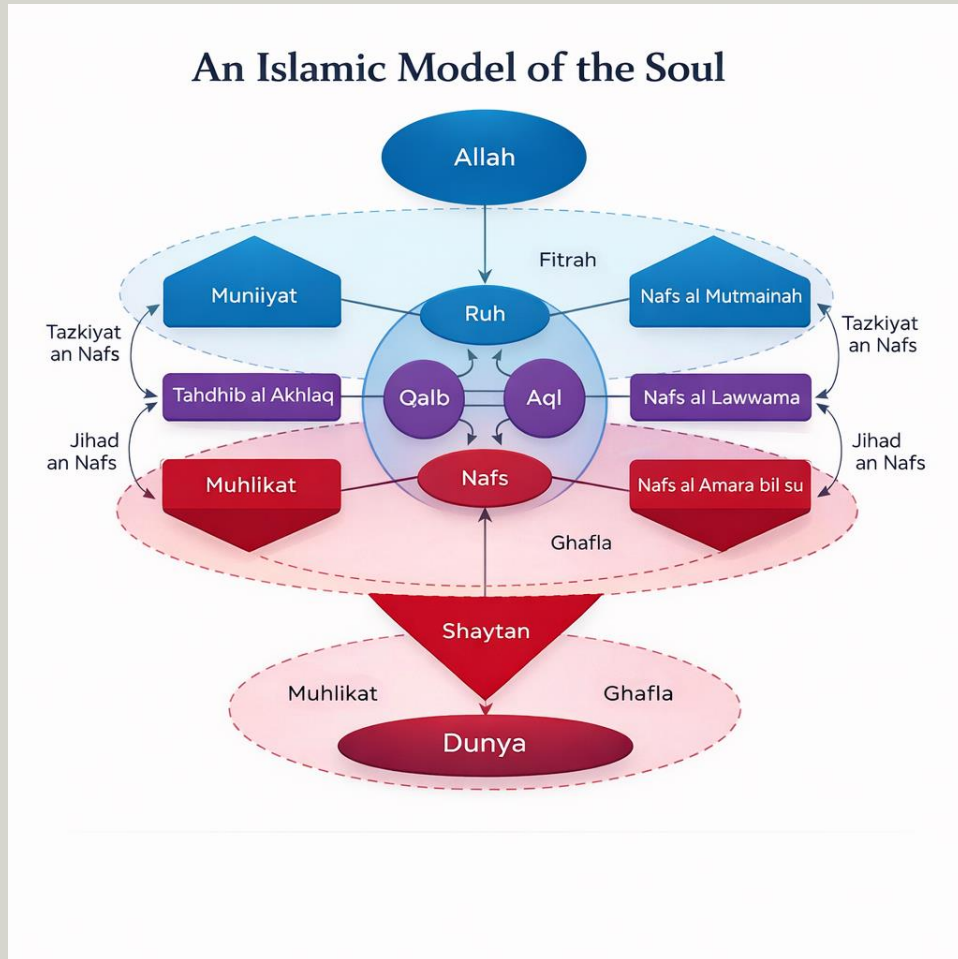

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

1. Introduce AI as a functional algorithmic activity
 - ❑ Go into the openai website
2. Show a video of a spiritual experience (crying in tarawih) then show a video of a robot.

Can the spiritual experience be functionally replicated?

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

No knowledge. No understanding.

AI creates functional correlations between physically observable phenomena and never crosses into the unobservable soul which we know through introspection and revelation
